Well, here we are at the end of the school year – and what a year it has been!

For those of you that have been following the life of our school, you know of our academic, athletic and extracurricular successes this year. We are the City Champs in Boys' Cross Country, Girls' Cross Country, Boys' Swim, Girls' Tennis, and Boys' Golf; we are the Centennial League Champions in Boys' Soccer, Girls' Tennis, Football, Girls' Wrestling, Boys' Wrestling, Girls' Cross Country, Boys' Swim, Boys' Bowling, Girls' Bowling, Volleyball, and Baseball; we are Regional or Sub-State Champions in Boys' Soccer, Girls' Tennis, Volleyball, Football, Girls' Cross Country, Girls' Wrestling, Boys' Wrestling, Girls' Bowling, Scholars Bowl, and Girls' Basketball; we are the State Champions in 4-Speaker Debate and Girls' Wrestling. Kevin Bordewick-Volleyball, Matt Swedlund-Girls Cross Country, Steve Buhler-Football, and Brian Hensyel-Soccer, all were named Centennial League Coach of the Year; Josh Hogan was named Regional Boys' Wrestling Coach of the Year. In addition, we have two State Boys' Swim Champs: Brogan Meier 50-yard Freestyle and Jack Miranda 500-yard Freestyle, we have three State Boys' Wrestling Champs: Easton Broxterman 132 lb. weight class, Brody Byrne 157 lb. weight class, and Kristjan Marshall 150 lb. weight class. We are hopeful for a strong finish to the spring season as well.

Our extra-curricular and co-curricular programs continue to flourish. Our AFJROTC unit Cadets have brought their learning to life, engaging in aerial refueling exercises with the 190th Air Refueling Wing. This April, they explored the National Air Force Museum and Wright-Patterson AFB in Dayton, Ohio. Before the academic year concludes, they will soar one more, this time with the Army National Guard aboard Blackhawk helicopters. Their commitment to community service is commendable, with over 2,000 hours dedicated for the sixth year running, alongside color guard and honor guard services at more than 20 local organizations and WRHS events.

Our Orchestra, Band, and Chorus took a fabulous trip to San Diego and Los Angeles, California over spring break where they performed at Universal Studios. Schedules for 2024-25

Tentative schedules for the 2024-25 school year will be available on Infinite Campus in mid-July. Counselors will be available during walk-in registration on August 1 and 2 to assist students with gaps and misplaced courses. Counselors are not available during the summer and therefore, all requests need to be made during walk in registration.

Preparing For IB Final Exams

When are IB final exams, and where will they be administered?

Exams begin on April 26 and end on May 17. All exams will be administered in the WRHS library, adjacent labs, or other nearby spaces (subject to change). Please see the schedule below for more details.

Do students sit for final exams in every IB subject?

No. Students enrolled in Group 6: The Arts courses do not sit for finals in those subjects. Instead, they have already completed portfolios, exhibitions, and other projects that are assessed by IB examiners. All other courses conclude with two or three final exams.

When will students receive their scores?

Students will be able to access their scores online on July 6 at 10:30am. The WRHS IB coordinator will share the website and login credentials with students in May.



How should students prepare for exams?

1. Eat and sleep well. Our bodies and brains perform better when we take care of them.
2. Use a space that is conducive to studying. It should be quiet, comfortable, and free of distractions.
3. Resist the temptation to procrastinate.
4. Make a plan and stick to it.
5. Know when you're sitting for certain exams, so you can prioritize subjects. Don't try to prepare for everything everyday.
6. Take breaks and reward yourself.
7. Form study groups and talk things out.
8. Prioritize your toughest subjects.
9. Know what to expect in the exam room. While students should be well aware of exam structures and topics at this point, they should not hesitate to reach out to Mr. Bowling or their teachers if they have questions.
10. Remember this: nothing that happens during final exams will make or break your life's fortunes. Relax and show off what you can do.

Congratulations to Tej Patel for being recognized as a Kansas Career and Technical Education Scholar 2024



This year in Engineering our goal was to learn about the functioning behind car crash safety devices. In order to discover and learn each group of students used two eggs and a premade chassis. Students were required to add two safety devices to effectively protect both eggs in a simulated crash. These safety devices could include bumpers, constructing roofing + doors, seatbelts, etc. As long as the safety devices resembled safety features found on cars, the all-clear was given.

Spring CTE Showcase 2024



The 3rd Annual spring CTE Showcase and Advisory Committee meeting was held on Wednesday April 5th from 1 to 3 in the WRHS library. Approximately 75 business leaders from various businesses attend the event.

WRHS students from all fifteen pathways were on hand to demonstrate projects and competencies achieved in their classes this year. NTHS Co-Presidents Molly Didde and Addison Jones were the emcees for the afternoon.

The advisory board members were impressed with the projects and the knowledge our students were able to exhibit. After having the opportunity to experience each of the student displays committee members and CTE Teachers held their final meeting of the year.



Career and Technical Education

Comprehensive Forensics Science

Using synthetic urine samples and synthetic reagents, students were able to perform presumptive tests for simulated substances including alcohol, codeine, heroin, and methamphetamine, while following the appropriate safety measures. The testing reagents undergo a color change in the presence of the target substances, which the students could then interpret to identify the substance present in the urine sample.



Washburn Rural FFA chapter sponsored its first Horse Judging Clinic

The WRHS and TCALC FFA chapters hosted the first annual Topeka Tune Up Horse Judging Invitational on April 10th at the North Topeka Saddle Club. Approximately sixty five students from eleven schools participated in this event in preparation for the Kansas State FFA Horse Judging contest on April 28th. Washburn Rural students participated by working as group leaders and monitoring the students participating, brushing, saddling, and walking horses. Some students even participated by bringing their own horses for evaluation. The horse judging CDE asks students to evaluate horses in various classes based on their build, quality of movement, and how responsive they are to the cues of the rider. We thank The Kansas State horse judging team as they provided the official judging, Brad Noller, North Topeka Saddle Club, and the community members that aided in this event by sponsoring the insurance, donating the facility, and donating their time to exhibit their horses.



