Program Highlight: Each month we will highlight a different academic program at Washburn Rural. This month, we are highlighting the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program.

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Program offers a comprehensive, college-preparation program based on international standards. The IB is offered in 159 countries around the world with the majority of IB schools in the USA. WRHS is one of eight high schools in Kansas to offer this program. The IB curriculum and assessments are developed by the IB Organization which is based in Switzerland.

The program emphasizes the IB Learner Profile Traits and strives to develop students who are caring, balanced, reflective, knowledgeable, inquirers, thinkers, communicators, risk takers, open-minded, and principled. Students take subjects in six groups: English, Language Acquisition, Individuals and Societies, Science, Math, and IB Elective. Our IB students work on completing both their WRHS diploma and an IB Diploma. To earn an IB Diploma, students take three Higher Level and three Standard Level courses and pass final exams which are graded around the world. IB exams are graded on a scale of 1-7 with a 4 being considered a Pass. In addition to the six IB exams, students complete the IB Core.

The IB Core includes Theory of Knowledge (ToK), Creativity-Activity-Service (CAS), and Extended Essay (EE). ToK is an epistemology course offered in the second semester of junior year and first semester of senior year. Students seek to answer the question, "How do we know what we know?" The CAS program is an extracurricular component of the program that expects students to engage in experiences outside of the classroom in creative pursuits, sports and other active opportunities, and community service. The EE gives students an opportunity to research a topic of choice independently to write a "mini-thesis" of no more than 4,000 words. These IB Core elements are at the heart of the IB program and help students develop into young scholars and contributors to our community.

The IB program starts junior year. Throughout the two-year program, students complete assessments and projects such as papers, oral presentations, and science labs that are submitted to IBO and contribute to the overall IB final grade. In May, students sit for final exam papers, and those scores are calculated with the submitted coursework to earn a final grade of 1-7. The exams are free. Students receive their results on July 6.

In Kansas, colleges must award credit for a score of 4 or higher. Typically, an IB exam of 4 will translate to 3 college credits or one class. Since one college class tends to cost around \$1000, we encourage families to view the IB Program as an investment. We have many WRHS students who start college with several credits earned by taking the IB exams.

Another advantage of pursuing the IB Diploma Program is that research indicates that IB students graduate college in 4 years at a rate of 86%. When we compare the Kansas 4 year college graduation rate of 36%, we know that our students who pursue IB courses are setting themselves up for success and are increasing their chances of earning their Bachelor's degree.

We hope all students will research their opportunities closely and consider stretching themselves.

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Pre-enrollment

WRHS pre-enrollment for the 2022-2023 school year is currently taking place. Students should utilize the information sent via email and introduced during advisory. This includes information on graduation requirements, post-secondary planning, and pre-enrollment information. All presentations and course guides can be found on the counseling website under ACADEMIC PLANNING. Counselors met with students in the auditorium to help with pre-enrollment on the following dates: January 20 (juniors), January 27 (sophomores), February 3 (freshmen). Pre-enrollment requests must be submitted to Naviance by March 3. When students have questions, they should email or see their <u>school counselor</u>.

Washburn University Institute of Technology Programs

A representative from Washburn Tech visits WRHS regularly to visit with interested students about admission procedures and the many career programs offered. Programs at Washburn Tech are for junior and senior students who are on track toward graduation. Interested students should see a counselor to sign up for the visit.

ACT on March 1

Nearly 300 juniors are registered for the ACT on March 1. Juniors should check their email regularly for updates on pre-registration sessions and testing details. Juniors were given an ACT preparation booklet on January 14. We encourage students to prepare for the test.

Many new scholarships have been added to the Counseling Website with February or March deadlines. The list provides access to applications as well as information on eligibility requirements and deadlines.

College Visits

Hall of Fame Induction

The Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony was held on December 10, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. Re-established in 2003, the Washburn Rural High School Hall of Fame honors graduates and staff members who have excelled and achieved significant accomplishments. It is our privilege to recognize these individuals.

Nominations for the Hall of Fame are accepted year round. Annual selections are made in May. Criteria necessary for recognition and nomination forms can be made directly from the District website http://www.usd437.net. The Hall of Fame plaques are displayed near the WRHS auditorium. Please consider nominating an outstanding alumnus or faculty member.



Nicole (Perkuhn) Hogan graduated from Washburn Rural High School in 2006. After graduating in 2006, Nicole double-majored at Washburn University earning her Bachelor of Business Administration degree in Marketing and Management in 2011. Nicole also earned her Associate of Science degree as a Physical Therapist Assistant from Washburn in 2011 and graduated with her Leadership Certificate. Following her undergraduate career at Washburn, Nicole pursued her passion in healthcare to become a physical therapist. Nicole was accepted into Wichita State University's Doctor of Physical Therapy program where she graduated in 2015. Dr. Nicole (Perkuhn) Hogan served as Wichita State University's Doctor of Physical Therapy Student Marshall for the College of Health Professions during graduation and was the recipient of Wichita State University's Susan

C. Tork Distinguished Student Award in recognition of outstanding service to the department, the community and the profession.

Dr. Hogan's involvement throughout her high school, undergraduate and graduate collegiate careers were extensive. At Washburn Rural High School, athletically, Nicole competed in four sports (tennis, golf, basketball, and softball) during her four years there. A decorated athlete, she was named to the Freshman Basketball All Tournament Team, named WIBW's High School Athlete of the Week (2004), received Softball All City & All Centennial League 1st Team Honors (2004-2006), earned Softball District and 1st Team All-State Honors (2006), named Softball Team Captain (2005 & 2006), recognized as WRHS Softball Most Valuable Player and Most Inspirational Player (2004), and named Best Offensive Player (2006). Nicole lettered in softball all four years, earning Conference and District Championships in 2002 and 2006, and appearing in two state tournaments (2002 & 2006). In 2005, Nicole was a member of the WRHS Girl's Golf State Championship Team and in 2006 was named Washburn Rural High School's Female Most Inspirational Athlete. Outside of athletics, Nicole was a member of the Honor Roll, National Honors Society (2004-2006), Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Interact, and involved in the vocal music program (Freshman Choir, Ambiance & Chorale) at Washburn Rural. To round off her high school career, Nicole was the female recipient of the McElroy Award in 2006, which recognizes achievement in academics, extra-curricular activities and character.

At Washburn University, Nicole's athletic and University involvement remained vast. She was a member of the Washburn University Softball Team where she was named to the MIAA Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll 2007-2010, the Dean and Presidential Honor Rolls, and was the recipient of the 2009-2010 Washburn Athletics Scholar Athlete Award. In addition to her involvement on the field, Nicole was highly involved off the field. She was a member of the Delta Gamma Fraternity where she held the highest GPA and received the Empowered Award (2007-2008). Nicole was also a Washburn University Student Ambassador, a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, a member of the Leadership Institute, President of Washburn Sales and Marketing Executives, on the School of Business Dean's Student Advisory Council, President of the Washburn University Physical Therapist Assistant Class of 2011, and Special Events Director of the Washburn University Student Association.

Nicole was involved in several organizations including, but not limited to, Washburn Collegiate 4-H, Bod Squad, Christian Challenge, Top Hat Honor Society, Alpha Lambda Delta, Mu Kappa Tau, Phi Kappa Phi, Beta Gamma Sigma, and Mortar Board.

She held various leadership positions in the above organizations during her time at Washburn, including Vice-President for NONOSO Senior Women's Honor Society where she received the Sophomore Woman of the Year Award in 2008. Nicole was dedicated to serving Washburn University and still is committed to giving back to others and the community. She was named Washburn University's Homecoming Queen in 2009.

After attending Washburn, Nicole attended Wichita State University where she earned her doctorate as a Physical Therapist. Dr. Hogan's passion for being involved and helping others remained evident during graduate school. She was the Kansas Physical Therapy Association Student Representative for Wichita State University's DPT Class of 2015, an Anatomy Graduate Teaching Assistant for Wichita State's Doctor of Physical Therapy and Dental Hygiene programs, Kansas Core Ambassador for the American Physical Therapy Association, Chairman for the Kansas Physical Therapy Association Student Special Interest Group, and sat on several committees of the American Physical Therapy Association Student Assembly Board of Directors.

Dr. Hogan began her career at The Center, official orthopaedic medical providers for the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Training Center, in Colorado Springs. While in Colorado Springs, Dr. Hogan volunteered for various community sports outreach programs, developed The Center's physical therapist mentorship program, developed a business plan for community outreach programs for softball, tennis and golf injury prevention, specifically focused on the female athlete, and an aquatic therapy program, participated in community injury prevention education programs, and developed marketing plans and initiatives for the Sports Performance Enhancement community outreach programs.

In June 2016, Dr. Hogan moved back to Kansas where she accepted a pediatric sports physical therapist position at Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center in Kansas City. She is currently located at Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center at Village West, which is also the training home of Sporting Kansas City, U.S. Soccer, and the U.S. Soccer National Coaching Education Center in the Compass Minerals National Performance Center. This is Dr. Hogan's fifth year as a sports physical therapist at Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center in Kansas City where she specializes in treating the softball and overhead athlete. Dr. Hogan has given several professional presentations, written various articles, continues to participate in community injury prevention education programs, and is on the Board of Directors for the Kansas Chapter of the American Physical Therapy Association. She is also a member of the Midwest Sports Science, Athletes Performance, Nutrition, and Medical Research committee, the KC Physical Activity Plan Healthcare (Sports Sector) committee, and an Advisor for the Kansas Physical Therapy Association Student Special Interest Group. Dr. Hogan is transforming lives by optimizing movement and health and continues to represent, promote and advocate for the profession of physical therapy to help move it forward.

In addition to Dr. Hogan's academic, athletic, and professional accolades, she was a camp counselor at Kanakuk Christian Sports Camp and was/still is very involved in the 4-H program, which provides children with community, mentors, and learning opportunities to develop the skills they need to create positive change in their lives and communities. Dr. Hogan was involved in the Shawnee County 4-H program for 13 years. She received the Shawnee County 4-H Key Award in 2006. Dr. Hogan continues to volunteer in the 4-H program empowering young people with the skills they need to lead for a lifetime. Dr. Nicole (Perkuhn) Hogan is married to Brent Hogan and they have three children: a daughter, Kenzie, and two sons, Benjamin and Daniel. They currently reside in Olathe, KS. Nicole is the daughter of Thomas (1978 WRHS graduate) and Karen Perkuhn. Sister, Megan (Perkuhn) Smith (2012) and brother, Drew Perkuhn (2014), are also both WRHS graduates.





1993 Girls Tennis Team (Class 6A State Champions) The 1993 Washburn Rural High School Girls Tennis Team was arguably one of the two best in a rich history of girls tennis at Washburn Rural. In 1992 a decision made by KSHSAA cost the team the State Championship by a single point. The following year the girls swept through the state finishing 1st in every event including City, League, Regional and State Championships. Our #1 Doubles team lost in the final (Van Vlack-McBride) but came back in 1994 to go undefeated and win the State Championship. Danielle Knipp placed 3rd twice and 2nd twice in singles during her four years at WRHS. She is one of the two WRHS players to be All-State all four years. Kelley Roberts won the State Discus as a Junior and played on a State Championship Girls Basketball team as well as placing 4th in Doubles with Colleen Pendley. As a Freshman, Emily Lee won All-City honors and gained experience making her our team leader in 1995 and 1996. Besides all of this they were a lot of fun and an all around great group of young ladies. "They were my Dream Team".

Washburn Rural High School History

On April 3, 1918, Washburn University President Parley Womer announced plans to establish an accredited four year public high school on its campus. Washburn High School (WHS) opened in the fall of 1918. Classes were held in the basement of the MacVicar Chapel from 1918-39 then moved during the 1939-40 term to the Old Ichabod Inn on the Washburn campus. Since the high school was located on WU's campus, the same colors of blue and white and the college mascot, Ichabod Washburn, were adopted by the high school. Students from WHS became known as the Junior Ichabods. In 1919, the first self-governing body of WHS was organized. The first yearbook was published and the first school play was performed in 1920. The Class of 1921 named their yearbook the Chimes—the title was reminiscent of the bells that rang from the Thomas gymnasium tower; to this date, the Chimes is still used as our yearbook name.

By 1939, crowded conditions on the campus forced WHS to relocate. In the fall of 1940, WHS moved into its own building located at 19th and Hope Street. By 1943, the second generation of Junior Ichabods was attending WHS. In 1946, the school became officially known as Washburn Rural High School. For many years the high school enjoyed its own building, which began in a rural setting; however, by 1953, the city had expanded surrounding the school. In the summer and fall of 1953 a new school on Wanamaker Road was built and the entire staff assisted in the move to the new building.

The first Homecoming and "Queen" traditions were started in 1954. In the fall of 1958, the school newspaper, the Bluestreak, was published. The first recorded "King and Queen of Courts" ceremony was in February 1962. The last year for the high school at this location would be 1964. The fall of '64 found the high school staff and students enjoying a new building at the current location. W.A. McElroy was the first superintendent appointed.

The 70's saw "This Generation" vocal group started and mobile classrooms to handle student growth. In 1981 the mascot became "Junior Blues." Our school community has a rich and deep tradition steeped in pride and excellence.

In looking through the history of the school, it is worth noting that in 1976, the Hall of Fame was established. In the spring of 1975, the Kansas State High School Activities Association (KSHSAA) began their campaign for nominees to their Hall of Fame recognition. Rural, like so many other Kansas schools, formed a committee to nominate staff, alumni and supporters for KSHSAA's Hall of Fame. Individuals that were nominated received a plaque and a scrapbook by the WRHS Hall of Fame committee. Between 1976 and 1984, the local Hall of Fame recognized these seven individuals.

Gatorade Player Of The Year

In its 37th year of honoring the nation's best high school athletes, Gatorade announced Brooklyn DeLeye of Washburn Rural High School is the 2021-22 Gatorade Kansas Volleyball Player of the Year. DeLeye is the second Gatorade Kansas Volleyball Player of the Year to be chosen from Washburn Rural High School.

The award, which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the court, distinguishes DeLeye as Kansas' best high school volleyball player. Now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Volleyball Player of the Year award to be announced in January, DeLeye joins an elite alumni association of state award-winners, including USA Volleyball players Kayla Banwarth (2006-07, Wahlert High School, Iowa), Alisha Glass (2005-06, Leland Public High School, Mich.), Jordan Larson (2004-05, Logan View High School, Neb.) and Foluke Akinradewo (2004-05, St. Thomas High School, Fla.).

The 6-foot-2 junior outside hitter compiled 586 kills and 259 digs this past season, leading the Junior Blues (41-2) to the Class 6A state semifinals. DeLeye also tallied 133 service aces, 38 assists and 26 blocks while posting a .563 kill percentage and a .438 hitting percentage. The Class 6A Player of the Year, DeLeye is a three-time First Team All- State selection and is ranked as the nation's No. 29 recruit in the Class of 2023 by PrepVolleyball.com. She concluded her junior year with a school-record for career kills with 1,633.

DeLeye works in the Washburn Rural High School coffee shop and is the secretary of the school's National Technical Honor Society. She has also volunteered locally as a youth volleyball and basketball coach. "Brooklyn DeLeye is the best all-around player in the state, hands down," said Nancy Dorsey, head coach of St. James Academy. "Playing their team is like playing a game of keep-away from Brooklyn."

DeLeye has maintained a weighted 4.18 GPA in the classroom. She has made a verbal commitment to play volleyball on scholarship at the University of Kentucky beginning in the fall of 2023.

The <u>Gatorade Player of the Year</u> program annually recognizes one winner in the District of Columbia and each of the 50 states that sanction high school football, girls volleyball, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, baseball, softball, and boys and girls track & field, and awards one National Player of the Year in each sport. The selection process is administered by the Gatorade Player of the Year Selection Committee, which leverages experts including coaches, scouts, media and others as sources to help evaluate and determine the state winners in each sport.

DeLeye joins recent Gatorade Kansas Volleyball Players of the Year Caroline Bien (2020-21, St. Thomas Aquinas High School), Kendra Wait (2019-20, Gardner Edgerton High School), Audrey Klemp (2018-19, St. James Academy), and Taylor Kuper (2017-18, Olathe Northwest High School), among the state's list of former award winners. Gatorade has a long-standing history of serving athlete communities and understands how sports instill valuable lifelong skills on and off the field. Through Gatorade's "Play it Forward" platform, DeLeye has the opportunity to award a \$1,000 grant to a local or national organization of their choosing that helps young athletes realize the benefits of playing sports. DeLeye is also eligible to submit a short video explaining why the organization they chose is deserving of one of twelve \$10,000 spotlight grants, which will be announced throughout the year. To date, Gatorade Player of the Year winners' grants have totaled more than \$3.5 million across more than 1,300 organizations.

Since the program's inception in 1985, Gatorade Player of the Year award recipients have won hundreds of professional and college championships, and many have also turned into pillars in their communities, becoming coaches, business owners and educators.

National Honor Society

On Thursday, December 2nd the Washburn Rural High School National Honor Society chapter held their annual induction ceremony in the auditorium. National Honors Society recognizes those who excel in the areas of scholarship, leadership, character, and service. Members are actively involved in the WRHS community and the wider community by participating in service events, clubs, co-curricular activities, sports, and a variety of other opportunities. Juniors and Seniors may apply for membership and must remain in good standing by abiding by the chapter bylaws and successful participation in NHS.

The National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) officially established the NHS in 1921. Though many local and regional honor societies existed prior to 1921, no nationwide organization had been founded. Under the leadership of Dr. Edward Rynearson, principal of the Fifth Avenue High School in Pittsburgh, the organization grew from the original Alpha Chapter at the Fifth Avenue School to more than 1,000 chapters by 1930. Equipped with a constitution, an emblem and motto, and a group of dedicated principals as coordinators, the new NHS organization quickly developed into one of the country's leading educational groups.

Members of the Junior Blues Chapter of National Honor Society (NHS) have been hard at work this year. In addition to providing their own contributions to our community and school, the students have organized and participated in a number of projects, including the following: organizing and hosting the Community Blood Center during a school wide blood drive, providing tutoring services to students in our district, and working with school and community member to raise funds for several local organizations.

Plans are underway to host several small fundraising campaigns at WRHS during the spring semester, and all proceeds will be used to support our local school community. Members of our local chapter have been collaborating with members of our Environmental Club to bring a composting initiative to Washburn Rural High School in order to educate the student body on the importance of living sustainably. Last year's NHS initiative has been continued through this year, which is to think locally in order to act globally.

Many of the members deserve special recognition for their efforts, and it would take a long list to highlight each deserving member. However, the officers this year have been extraordinary. Donna Jalosjos, Gorata Mackenzie, Karyna Cheung, and Arushi Garg have shown tremendous leadership and dedication. The 2021-2022 policy debate season marked a return to relative normalcy, with tournaments being held in-person instead of online, and students traveling around the state to debate a topic about protecting water resources. The Washburn Rural squad had tremendous success in both the varsity and novice divisions, winning over a dozen tournaments and collecting numerous individual and team awards on top of those victories.

Washburn Rural's success culminated with qualifications to three separate national tournaments and success at the KSHSAA 6A debate tournament. This year, Washburn Rural qualified three teams to the National Speech and Debate Association national tournament. The teams of Sonya Doubledee/Donna Jalosjos, Jiyoon Park/Zach Willingham, and Lauren Reed/Jackson Taylor will represent Washburn Rural in Louisville, KY this summer.





At the KSHSAA 6A Debate tournament, both our 4-Speaker and 2-Speaker debaters had impressive results. In the 4 speaker division, Sonya Doubledee/Donna Jalosjos and Jiyoon Park/Zach Willingham went undefeated at both regionals and state, becoming the first ever team to go undefeated at the KSHSAA 6A state debate tournament in 4-Speaker. In 2-Speaker, Washburn Rural qualified four teams to compete, which is the maximum number allowed. The team of Karissa Kromminga/Lauren Reed won the 2-Speaker division, the first state 2-Speaker championship for Washburn Rural since 2008. This was only the second time in state history that a 6A school has won both the 2-Speaker and 4-Speaker divisions of state.

Why do we **Career and Technical Education**?

Career Technical Education (CTE) helps students graduate prepared for success in college and career by providing the following:

Career Exploration: CTE courses in approved pathways progress from introductory to technical to application levels that support state and national standards and competencies. The foundation for CTE courses is the inclusion of knowledge and skills that all students should achieve for a given career. Students can choose high school courses based on the results from their career interest survey and apply the knowledge from those courses to identify a career field that fits their interests and skills.

Hands-on learning: Competencies in technical and application level courses focus on acquiring practical technical skills specific to the cluster/pathway and and includes opportunities for the learner to demonstrate knowledge learned through practical application of skills. It may include experiences such as an internship, health science clinical, or school-based training/marketing.

Real World Experience: WRHS juniors and seniors who earn passing grades in two or more courses in one career pathway are eligible to participate in work-based learning. According to KSDE, an internship is a supervised work-based experience that links a learner with an employer for a planned set of activities designed to give the learner a broad overview of a business or occupational field (can be for a short or long term period/paid or unpaid).

Community Partnerships: Each CTE cluster or pathway must establish its own industry-unique Advisory Committee. The Advisory Committee members evaluate the Career and Technical Education (CTE) cluster/pathway they are serving and advise the CTE coordinator and local administration on improvement of the cluster/pathway.
