

February is CTE Month®

Governor Laura Kelly is expected to sign a proclamation designating February as CTE Month in the state of Kansas. CTE Month is a national celebration of the value of Career Technical Education and its impact on students, communities, and the economy. In CTE, learners gain real-world skills through hands-on learning and explore career opportunities, both inside and outside the classroom. Students graduate with more confidence in their plans for education and employment after high school.

To celebrate CTE Month, WRHS has invited the Kansas Board of Regents to share a presentation to our CTE staff about Excel in CTE, an initiative of 2012, formerly known as Senate Bill 155. The intent of the program is to better prepare high school students for college and careers. Kansas high school students qualify for state-funded college tuition in approved technical courses offered by Kansas technical and community colleges. Programming & Software Development Pathway

Haley Schmitz is the Computer Science Teacher, Computer Science Honor Society Advisor, and Coding Club Sponsor at WRHS. She and her students hosted a Coding Carnival for elementary students in the district to help celebrate Computer Science Education Week and introduce various concepts and applications of computer science in everyday life. The honor society students planned and executed the event by creating various activities for all elementary grade levels to enjoy.

At one station, participants pulled plastic ducks out of a small tub and then translated numbers on them into their equivalent in binary. At another station, the high school students taught the younger students how to program instructions by blindfolding one of them and having others give verbal instructions to walk through a tape maze. Students also learned how to race the Sphero BOLT programmable robots that were purchased with a grant from the Auburn-Washburn Foundation.



IB Students Learn About How We Learn

What is Theory of Knowledge?

ToK is a one-year course that prompts IB diploma candidates to explore how we construct knowledge, evaluate our own views of the world, and identify factors involved in shaping our perspectives. Students compare and contrast the methodologies of various disciplines to ascertain what is true or *possibly* true.

What are our students doing in ToK?

There are two major projects all IB students must complete in ToK: the exhibition and essay. The *exhibition* asks students to pull from real-life scenarios and experiences to answer a question about a ToK theme. Here are a few topics from this year's exhibitions:

- Rosetta Stone, a tire jack, and a spinning frame: Does our knowledge depend on our interactions with other knowers?
- A surrealist painting, a Halloween costume, and a book about imaginary numbers: What role does imagination play in producing knowledge about the world?
- A crystal collection, DNA tests, and the Fermilab particle accelerator: To what extent is certainty attainable?

The TOK *essay* is a 1,600-word exploration of a complex question about perspectives, worldviews, and systems of understanding. Here are a few sample prompts and thesis statements from the Class of 2023:

- "For artists and natural scientists, which is more important: what can be explained or what cannot be explained?" What can be explained is more important to the arts and natural sciences as it provides a basis for both to expand on.
- "Are visual representations always helpful in the communication of knowledge? Discuss with reference to the human sciences and mathematics." Because visual representations often require previous contextual knowledge to possess any meaning and have the possibility of conveying misleading knowledge, they are not always helpful in the communication of knowledge.
- "Is replicability necessary in the production of knowledge? Discuss with reference to two areas of knowledge."
 Replicability is often important for certainty but is not absolutely essential for something to be "known".

IB seniors on ToK:

"ToK was probably my favorite class because it forced discussion and nuance. The interactive nature of the course meant that I wasn't bogged down by tests, but instead got to think and write about specific situations and apply my learning. The open-ended nature of the projects made them feel less daunting or restrictive than they might otherwise have been." -Evander

"The class itself promotes deep and nuanced discussion, and Mr. Raugewitz does a great job teaching the course. I like how we explored multiple areas of knowledge like the arts, the natural sciences, and history. It made the class more interesting to the whole audience." -Noah

"Some of the topics we discussed were fairly heavy, but the curriculum was interesting and we had lots of good discussions in the class." -Makayla

Debate

Congratulations to the WRHS Debate program!
They are the State Champions in 4-Speaker Debate!
This is the seventh consecutive year that we have won the State 4-Speaker Championship! A huge shout-out to Evander Davis, Karissa Krominga, Kavi Chidambaranathan, and Aditi Nimashakavi for a job well done!

In the 4-Speaker tournament, one team debates on the affirmative in all rounds and one team debates on the negative. In the end, their records are added together and the school with the best combined record takes home the state championship. Kavi Chidambaranathan and Aditi Nimishakavi represented the affirmative on the topic, while Evander Davis and Karissa Kromminga were our negative team.



This year's topic centered around the United States

Federal Government's security cooperation with NATO over emerging technologies. Our affirmative team read several different cases, suggesting that we cooperate with NATO over developing 5G infrastructure, artificially intelligent ballistic missile defense, or advanced pandemic responses using biotechnology. Kavi and Aditi finished with a 6-2 record at the tournament, taking losses to great teams from Shawnee Mission South and Lawrence Free State, whose negative team was one of two undefeated teams at the tournament.

The other undefeated team throughout the competition was our negative team, Evander Davis and Karissa Kromminga. In debate, the negative is tasked with disproving the affirmative team's case, despite not knowing what the proposal will be until the affirmative team presents it in their first speech. Despite this difficult task, Evander and Karissa rose to the occasion, winning all 8 of their debates unanimously, finishing with 24 ballots over the course of the tournament. This was the first time in our streak of victories that a team won not only all of its debate rounds, but all of the judges' individual votes.

Overall, our team finished with a 14-2 record, which was sufficient to secure a state championship for the 7th consecutive season! With half of the team returning next year, we are hopeful to continue our success on the 2023-2024 debate topic on income inequality.
