I do hope that you had a memorable winter break. As you know, another semester is underway at WRHS and it is shaping up to be as eventful as the last! Winter sports and activities are in full swing and classes are going well!

A very important upcoming event that I would like to direct your attention to is Student Led-Conferences. They will occur on Wednesday and Thursday, February 12 and 13 respectively. Conference times are:

One of the most important things that you can do as a parent to help your child achieve is to not only establish regular and open communication with their teachers, but also become informed about what courses and programs your student most enjoys and the ways in which high school experiences and opportunities can and will relate to post-secondary success. Our Student-Led Conferences afford students and parents the opportunity for this very thing, alongside their Advisory Teacher. The primary focus for spring conferences will consist of students' reflections of the courses they've taken and the courses in which they are planning to take next school year. Students will talk to parents about their individualized 4-year Plan of Study, share their academic and personal goals, and reflect upon how these things connect to careers of interest. I would also encourage you to share any other information about your child that would assist us in better understanding their needs.

We plan to offer the same scheduling opportunities as we did in October through our scheduling platform, myconferencetime.com. Students will sign up during their advisory class for their Student-Led Conference during the week of January 27th. Beginning February 3rd, you will have the opportunity to schedule with as many of your student's other teachers as you need to. 15-minute appointments will be available and you'll have the opportunity to choose virtual or in-person meetings. Our Counseling and Administrative Staffs will also be listed on our scheduling platform and available during conferences. Please do not hesitate to schedule with one of us.

As we move closer to the end of the third 9-weeks, we are aware that some students may be struggling. Tuesday/Thursday Interventions continue and are a great opportunity for students who need more time on campus to work. If your child is referred by our staff, we certainly hope you will support our efforts to ensure their success by encouraging attendance. It is our mission to ensure that every student learns to the best of their ability.





Debate

Congratulations to our 4-speaker team of Harris Chaudhry, Kavi Chidambaranathan, Campbell Hight and Aditi Nimishakavi for finishing as runners-up at this year's 6A KSHSAA State 4-Speaker tournament! They were also one of the only 6A schools with 12 students debating between 2-speaker and 4-speaker. In 2-speaker, they had two of the top 16 teams! Congratulations to Joel Jijo/Garv Khurana, who finished in the top 16 and to Tarrence Byrd/Sophie Heinen who finished in the top 8.



The Jr. Blues' nationally qualified entries were in action in their first warm-up tournament for nationals. Harris Chaudhry/Campbell Hight and Shri Chidambaranathan/Jace Raines finished 4-2 in preliminaries in Iowa. Chidambaranathan/Raines barely missed elimination rounds as the 9 seed. Chaudhry/Hight broke as the 4th seed. They won their quarters and semi-final debates on 3-0 decisions. The semi-finals win secured them another bid to the Tournament of Champions in April!



AFJROTC

AFJROTC finished a great first semester by winning the Inaugural Topeka West Specialist Kyle G. Thomas Drill Competition on December 13th. It is the school's first ever meet championship. The unarmed regulation drill team and our unarmed color guard both placed first. While the armed regulation drill team was second place, freshman Karma Kneale finished 6th place in Individual drill.

The Academic Bowl team also advanced to the second round of the National AFJROTC Academic Bowl competition for the 11th straight year. Academic Bowl team members are Ivan Beach, Parker Chapman, Evan Garcia, Rhiannon Good, Mariah McDonald, and Kelcie Schneider.

World Language

World Language is gearing up for the 2025 March Madness of Music in the French, German, and Spanish classes. Just like college basketball has March Madness, we have the Manie Musicale de Mars, Musik im März Madness, and La Locura de Marzo in each of our languages! The students will fill out a 16 song bracket to indicate which songs that they think will win. These songs have been selected by language teachers nationally. Each day of the competition, they will listen to two competing songs and vote for their favorite. Students from all over the United States participate in this musical competition and by the end of March, we will crown a National Champion! This competition will expose the students to different musical artists and genres of music while allowing them to hear the songs that kids their age listen to every day.

World language students are also preparing for the AAPPL and IB tests in each of the languages. IB language students will take the IB test while upper level students in each of the languages will take the AAPPL test. These tests evaluate the levels of proficiency that students have in listening, speaking, reading and writing in the second language. Students who demonstrate a high level of proficiency in English and in the second language will receive the Kansas State Seal of Biliteracy which informs employers of their ability in language.



Washburn Rural Theatre

Washburn Rural Theatre - Thespian Troupe #6193 made some spectacular achievements at the Kansas Thespian Festival held in January.

- The troupe was recognized as 1 of 33 schools to take home a Kansas Gold Honor Troupe trophy for their accomplishments during the 2024 year.
- Twenty-one students competed in the Thespy competitions with 13 students receiving a Superior, International Qualifying rating, with all other students receiving excellent ratings!
- Owen Tremblay completed a tech Senior audition, received many callbacks from schools around the region, and received a Kansas State Thespian Scholarship.
- Addie Resch was selected from over 500 Thespy entries to perform in the Thespy Showcase of 10 performances.
- Weston Widman was selected to be 1 of 6 Kansas State Thespian Officers for the upcoming year to represent our troupe and advocate for theatre in Kansas.

CTE WORKS!

Career and technical education (CTE)

engages students and prepares them with the skills they need for fulfilling careers in vital, in-demand industries and occupations.

> CTE is associated with higher levels of student engagement¹ and reduced rates of dropout.² In fact, the average high school graduation rate for CTE concentrators – students who take multiple courses in one CTE program area – is 96%³ compared to the national rate of 85%.4

CTE WORKS FOR **HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS**

CTE concentrators are slightly more likely than non-concentrators to enroll in postsecondary education and are just as likely to earn a degree or certificate.5

Adults who earn short-term credentials through integrated basic skills and technical training programs are more likely to enroll in postsecondary education.⁵

Health & BioScience

Students in our Biomedical Research class are on the front lines of tackling the antibiotic resistance crisis. Over the course of the semester, they investigated innovative approaches—ranging from discovering new bacteria capable of producing novel antibiotics to reprogramming antibiotic-resistant strains so they become sensitive again. At the conclusion of their first semester of research, the students documented their insights in reflective papers and shared their findings in engaging end-of-semester presentations to the class and members of the audience. Students are working towards completing the BACE Exam in May.



Stall of Fame Induction—

Established in 2003, the Washburn Rural High School Hall of Fame recognizes graduates and staff who have achieved remarkable accomplishments at the local, state, or national levels. We are thrilled to announce this year's inductees:

Michael Brennan (1974–2022) – A 1992 graduate of Washburn Rural High School, Brennan earned acclaim as a vocal coach, musician, and composer. He served as musical director for Broadway tours Victor/Victoria, Cinderella, and Disney's The Lion King. In Las Vegas, Brennan contributed to iconic shows like Le Rêve, which was named "Best Show in Las Vegas" for nine consecutive years. His original scores have captivated global audiences. He created "One Night for One Drop" for Cirque du Soleil and "Celestia" at The STRAT, which won "Best New Show" in 2019 and was featured on America's Got Talent. His musical "Citizen Ruth" won Best Musical at the New York International Fringe Festival, and his animated shorts have earned over 80 international film awards.

2008 Girls Softball Team – The 2008 state championship softball team concluded their season with a 23-2 record. During the state tournament, the team did not allow a single earned run and gave up only one run in three games. In addition to claiming the state title, the team also won the Centennial League and Regional Championships. Seven of the 13 players on that team went on to play collegiate softball.

Kevin Hedberg – A fixture of Washburn Rural for 32 years, Coach Kevin Hedberg began his career in 1991 and left a legacy of excellence as both a teacher and tennis coach. In addition to being named Auburn-Washburn's Secondary Teacher of the Year in 2022, he amassed an incredible 22 Coach of the Year awards during his tenure. Under his leadership, WRHS tennis players achieved 58 All-State honors and his teams secured 47 city championships, 42 league championships, 41 regional championships, and five 6A state championships. Coach Hedberg's contributions to tennis earned him induction into the Missouri Valley Tennis Association Hall of Fame in 2013 and the Kansas Tennis Coaches Hall of Fame in 2023.

The 2025 Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony took place on Friday, January 17, 2025 in the WRHS Cafeteria. Inductees were also honored on the court between the girls' and boys' varsity basketball games. 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


