Welcome back! I do hope that you had a memorable winter break. As you know, another semester is underway at WRHS and it is shaping up to be as eventful as the last! Winter sports and activities are in full swing and classes are going well!

A very important upcoming event that I would like to direct your attention to is Student-Led Conferences. They will occur on Wednesday and Thursday, February 18 and 19 respectively. Conference times are:

One of the most important things that you can do as a parent to help your child achieve is to not only establish regular and open communication with their teachers, but also become informed about what courses and programs your student most enjoys and the ways in which high school experiences and opportunities can and will relate to post-secondary success. Our Student-Led Conferences afford students and parents the opportunity for this very thing, alongside their Advisory Teacher. The primary focus for spring conferences will consist of students' reflections of the courses they've taken and the courses in which they are planning to take next school year. Students will talk to parents about their individualized 4-year Plan of Study, share their academic and personal goals, and reflect upon how these things connect to careers of interest. I would also encourage you to share any other information about your child that would assist us in better understanding their needs.

We plan to offer the same scheduling opportunities as we did in October through our scheduling platform, myconferencetime.com. Students will sign up during their advisory class for their Student-Led Conference between February 2nd and February 13th. Beginning February 16th, you will have the opportunity to schedule with as many of your student's other teachers as you need to. 15-minute appointments will be available and you'll have the opportunity to choose virtual or in-person meetings. Our Counseling and Administrative Staffs will also be listed on our scheduling platform and available during conferences. Please do not hesitate to schedule with one of us.

As we move closer to the end of the third 9-weeks, we are aware that some students may be struggling. Tuesday/Thursday Interventions continue and are a great opportunity for students who need more time on campus to work. If your child is referred by our staff, we certainly hope you will support our efforts to ensure their success by encouraging attendance. It is our mission to ensure that every student learns to the best of their ability.

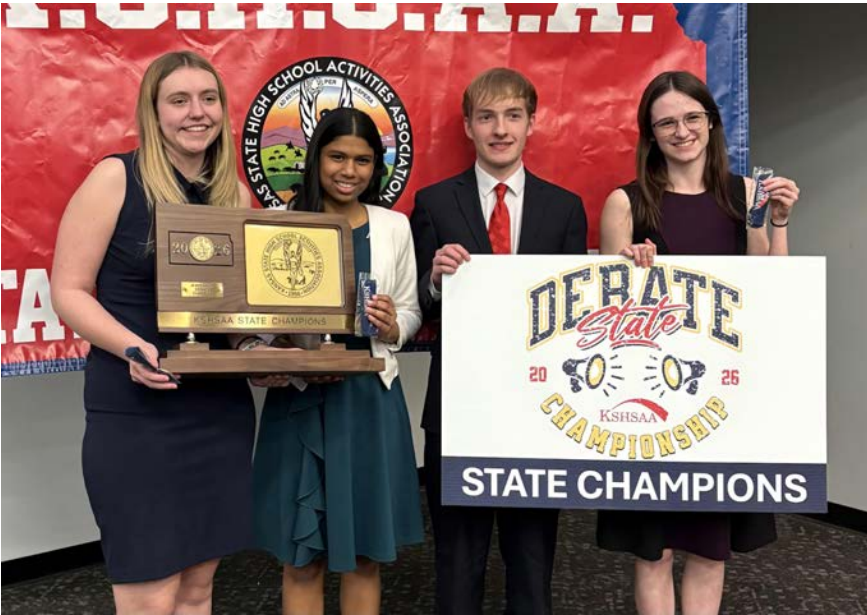

AFJROTC had a solid first semester with their marksmanship team finishing their regular season with a five game winning streak and raised their position to 5th place in the Air Force division of the Orion League. The drill team finished 3rd in the 14 team, Topeka West color guard and drill competition. The Academic Bowl team advanced to the second round of the College Options Foundation Academic Bowl Championships for the 13th consecutive year. And our cadets completed nearly 1,000 community service hours while excelling in competition.

The drill team will be back in action at the Lee's Summit Invitational on February 7th. Finally, they will visit Joint Base San Antonio, TX for our curriculum in action trip at the end of March.

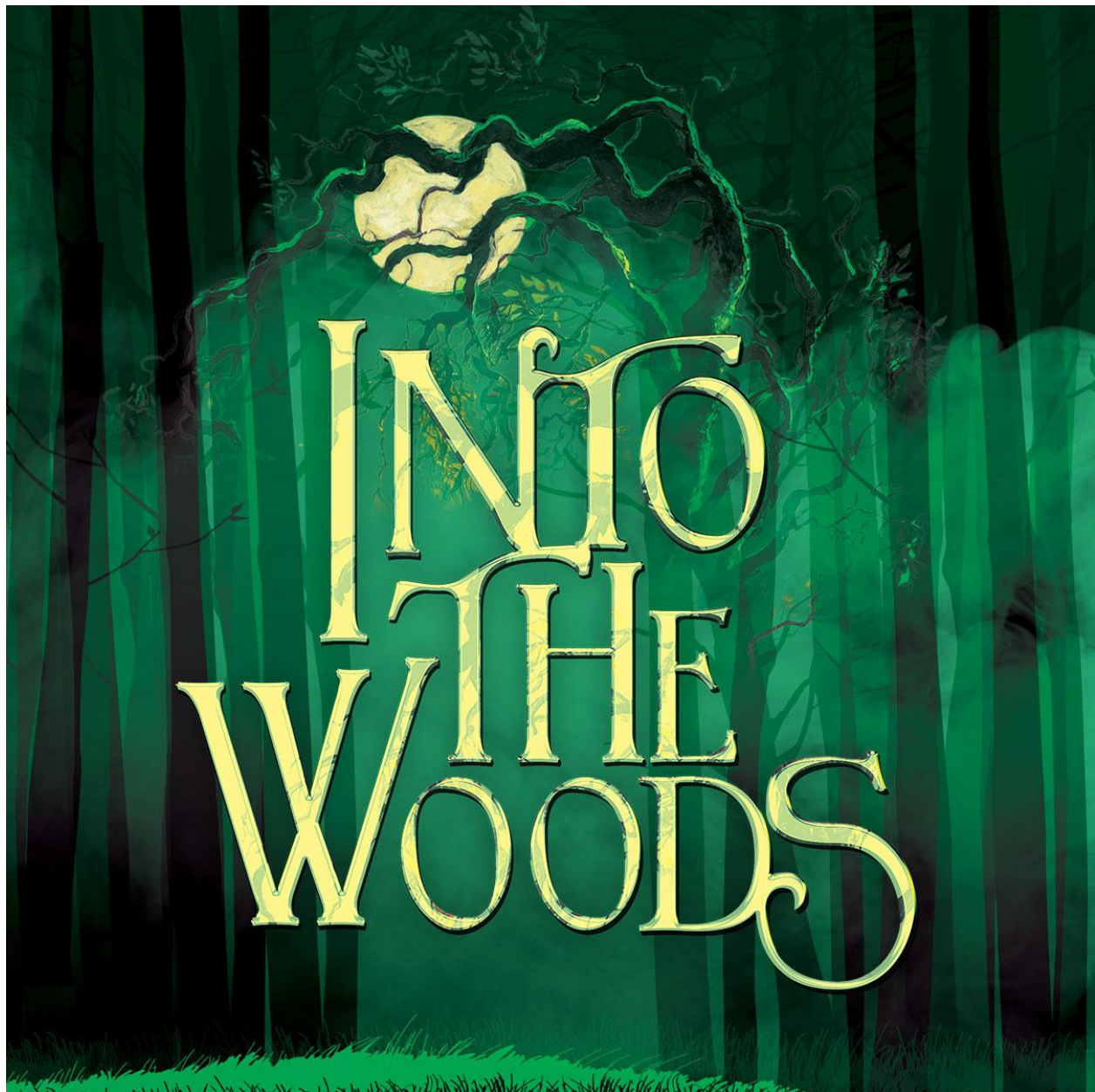

Scholastic Art Competition

Fifteen talented artists from Washburn Rural High School received recognition for their work at the 2026 Regional Scholastic Art Competition in Wichita.

The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards is the nation's longest-running, most prestigious educational initiative supporting student achievement in the visual and literary arts. The Scholastic Awards look for work that demonstrates originality, technical skills, and the emergence of personal voice or vision.

This year, more than 1,600 artworks were submitted by students across Eastern Kansas, with 509 pieces earning regional honors from local Scholastic Awards affiliate Mark Arts. Award recipients' work was recognized by a panel of creative professionals as the most outstanding work submitted. Washburn Rural High School had 29 works selected this year. Silver and Gold Key works will be on display at Mark Arts from Friday, February 6, through Saturday, March 28. The Open House and Awards Ceremony will take place on Saturday, March 28 from 10 am - 12 pm.

◆ Hall of Fame

On January 9th, the 2026 Washburn Rural High School Hall of Fame inductees were honored during an induction ceremony.

Christopher Currie (Class of 1983) – Currie built an extraordinary 21-year career in the United States Marine Corps, retiring as a Gunnery Sergeant. He spent 17 years in the elite Marine Corps Reconnaissance community and deployed in multiple major operations, including Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom, and Iraqi Freedom. His courage and leadership under fire earned him the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with Combat Distinguishing Device, among other honors. Currie's lifelong commitment to service exemplifies the highest ideals of leadership, integrity, and dedication.

1989 WRHS Football Team – The 1989 Junior Blues completed a perfect 12–0 season and captured the Class 5A state championship in a thrilling 10–8 victory over Salina Central. Led by head coach Ron Bowen, the team's dominant defense, resilience in close games, and unmatched toughness defined one of the greatest seasons in WRHS football history.

Tickets will only be sold at the door for Washburn Rural students the evening of the dance.



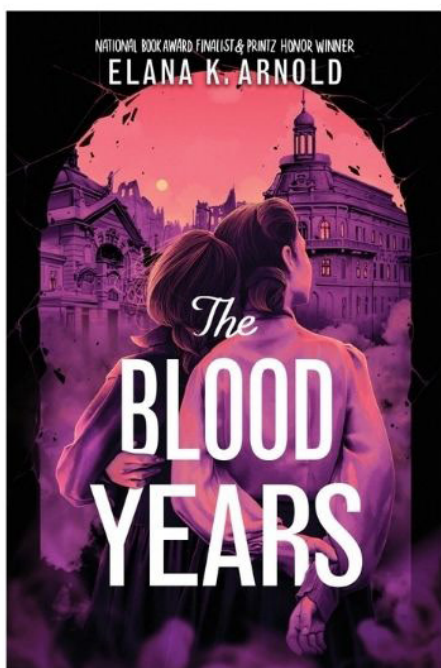

Women in Business Career Summit Inspires the Next Generation of Leaders

On Monday, November 10, 2025, students from across the region gathered at Kansas State University for the annual Women in Business Career Summit, a day designed to empower future leaders through hands-on learning, real-world stories, and direct connections with industry professionals. From the first morning welcome, to the afternoon scholarship awards, the event offered students a powerful look at the diverse paths women are taking to shape the future of business, technology, design, and leadership.

The day opened in the K-State Student Union with a warm welcome and overview before students moved into the first round of breakout sessions. Presenters shared their expertise on careers in social media, corporate leadership, architecture, actuarial science, and the built environment. Each session encouraged students to explore new possibilities, whether learning how brands grow online, understanding pathways to corporate boardrooms, or discovering how math and risk analysis drive actuarial careers.

During the second breakout block, students explored topics such as personal branding, women's journeys into information technology, leadership and curiosity in college, therapeutic horticulture, and the growing role of artificial intelligence in the workplace. These sessions blended creativity, career planning, and self-discovery, helping students better understand how their strengths can shape their futures.

At lunch, attendees gathered in the Grand Ballroom for a keynote address by Andrea Albright, Executive Vice President and Chief Growth Officer at Walmart International. Albright shared insights from her global leadership experience and offered encouragement to students preparing to enter an evolving workforce.

The afternoon concluded at the K-State College of Business, where faculty, staff, and current students welcomed attendees for a networking session, panel discussion, and scholarship celebration. Five K-State business students shared candid stories about navigating college, exploring majors, and developing confidence as young professionals. More than \$15,000 in scholarships were awarded, including Washburn Rural's own Giselle Foster, who earned a \$1,000 scholarship to Kansas State University for her leadership, ambition, and commitment to excellence.

Washburn University Dean Shares Career Insights with Students



On December 15, Dr. Dean Sollars, Dean of the School of Business at Washburn University, visited Mr. McFall's Consumer and Personal Finance class to share his career journey and discuss opportunities available through Washburn's business programs.

Dr. Sollars spoke about his path into higher education leadership, explaining how his background in economics, teaching, and administration led him to his current role as dean. He emphasized that careers do not always follow a straight line and that adaptability, education, and a willingness to take on leadership roles are key factors in long-term success.

As dean, Dr. Sollars oversees Washburn University's School of Business, which offers a wide range of undergraduate and graduate programs, including accounting, finance, marketing, management, entrepreneurship, data analytics, and international business. He shared how Washburn focuses on preparing students for real-world careers by combining strong academics with hands-on learning, internships, and connections to local and regional businesses.

Dr. Sollars also highlighted the importance of AACSB accreditation, a prestigious recognition earned by only a small percentage of business schools worldwide. This accreditation ensures that Washburn business students

receive a high-quality education that meets rigorous academic and professional standards, helping graduates stand out to employers and graduate schools.

In addition to discussing academics, Dr. Sollars talked about recent campus improvements, including the remodeling of Henderson Hall into Advisor's Hall. This updated facility is designed to better support students through academic advising, career planning, and student services. Advisor's Hall reflects Washburn's commitment to helping students navigate college choices and career goals with personalized support. Dr. Sollars encouraged students to begin thinking early about their future careers, take advantage of available resources, and remain open to learning opportunities. His visit gave students valuable insight into higher education, leadership, and how Washburn University supports student success from enrollment through graduation and beyond.

Local Entrepreneur Shares Real-World Business Lessons with Students

On December 16th, Brian Green of Allstate Insurance visited Mr. McFall's Consumer and Personal Finance class to share his journey as an entrepreneur and business owner, offering students a firsthand look at what it takes to build long-term success.

Mr. Green explained that his path was not a straight line. While attending the University of Kansas, where he studied business with a concentration in English, he started a lawn care business to earn money. After college, he worked as a sales representative for a Topeka glass company before purchasing his own insurance agency about 20 years ago. Today, he owns and operates numerous businesses, including insurance, metal fabrication, and real estate ventures.

A major focus of Mr. Green's presentation was entrepreneurship. He emphasized that working for yourself means your effort directly impacts your income. Starting and running businesses, while challenging, keeps you motivated, adaptable, and constantly learning. According to Mr. Green, successful business owners learn to think beyond their daily routines, develop strong problem-solving skills, and view problems as opportunities to create solutions. He encouraged students to use technology to their advantage and to take initiative rather than waiting to be told what to do.

Mr. Green also shared insights from his experience owning more than 50 rental properties. He explained that rental properties are a long-term investment, with profits gradually paying down mortgages until properties are fully owned. Creating value through remodeling, partnerships, and hands-on maintenance is key to maximizing profitability over time.

One of the strongest messages from Mr. Green's talk was the importance of relationships. He stressed that relationships with customers, business partners, banks, and the community are essential to success. Building trust, maintaining strong service, and networking can open unexpected doors and lead to new opportunities. In real estate and insurance alike, relationships and service help smaller businesses compete with larger companies and keep customers coming back through referrals.

Through his story and advice, Mr. Green showed students that hard work, problem-solving, and strong relationships are at the core of entrepreneurial success, valuable lessons that extend far beyond the classroom.

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Guest Speaker Highlights Affordable Housing in Consumer & Personal Finance Class

Mr. McFall's Consumer and Personal Finance students recently welcomed Trina Tyler from Security Benefit, who shared valuable insights on affordable housing and the financial decisions that impact where and how people live.

Mrs. Tyler explained that a common financial guideline is to spend no more than 30% of income on housing. When housing costs rise above that level, it can feel like a "freight train" hitting a household's budget, leaving little room for savings or other essential expenses.

She discussed practical steps individuals can take when housing costs exceed 30% of their income, including cutting expenses, working additional hours, and increasing savings. Mrs. Tyler also emphasized the importance of seeking support from one's community, such as teachers, parents, and grandparents, when facing financial challenges.

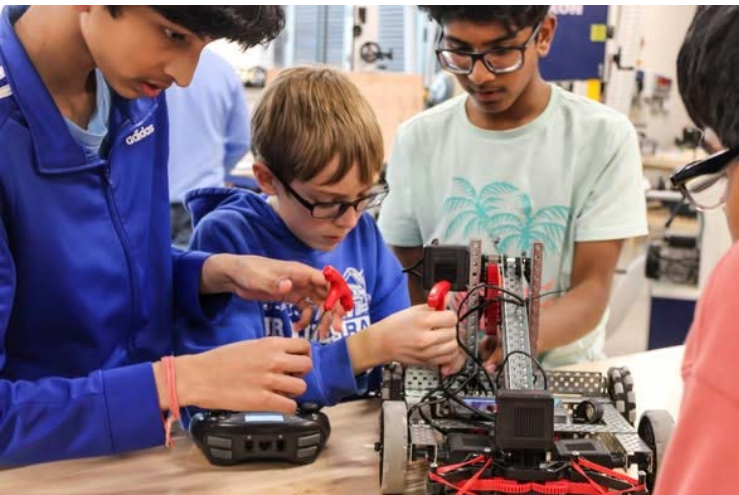
The presentation also explored how zoning laws, commercial versus residential, affect housing availability and cost. Students learned that low-income housing is not necessarily poor-quality housing, and that many housing options are supported through government assistance or provided by nonprofit community housing organizations.

Mrs. Tyler concluded by introducing concepts such as inclusionary housing and the roles of local, state, and federal governments in addressing housing needs. Her visit helped students better understand how housing decisions connect to budgeting, community resources, and long-term financial stability.

Architecture & Construction Pathway



Students in the Washburn Rural High School (WRHS) Architecture & Construction pathway witnessed a historic moment this afternoon as FHLBank Topeka president and CEO Jeff Kuzbel presented a \$10,000 check in support of the program. 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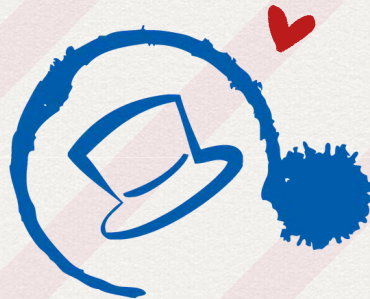

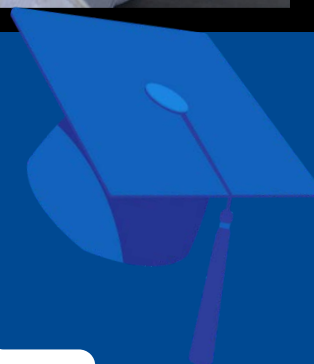
