Well, here we are at the end of the school year – and what a year it has been!

For those of you that have been following the life of our school, you know of our academic, athletic and extracurricular successes this year. We are the City Champs in Boys' Swim and Dive, Boys' Cross Country, Girls' Cross Country, and Girls' Golf; we are the Centennial League Champions in Boys' Soccer, Girls' Bowling, Boys' Bowling, Girls' Wrestling, Girls' Cross Country, Boys' Cross Country, Volleyball, and Boys' Golf; we are Regional or Sub-State Champions in Boys' Soccer, Girls' Tennis, Volleyball, Boys' Bowling, Girls' Basketball, and Girls' Wrestling; we are the State Champions in Volleyball, 4-Speaker Debate, Boys' Bowling, and Girls' Wrestling.

Brian Hensyel was named All-City Boys' Soccer Coach of the Year; Steve Buhler was named Shawnee County Football Co-Coach of the Year; Matt Swedlund was named City Cross Country Co-Coach of the Year; Kevin Bordewick was named Centennial League Volleyball Coach of the Year, and will also be inducted into the Shawnee County 2023 Sports Hall of Fame. In addition, we have two State Wrestling Champs, Easton Broxterman-Boys' 113 lb. weight division, and Landen Kocher-Munoz-Boys' 120 lb. weight division, and Brooklyn DeLeye was named Kansas Gatorade Volleyball Player of the Year for a second year in a row. We are hopeful for a strong finish to the spring season as well.

Our extra-curricular and co-curricular programs continue to flourish. Our AFJROTC unit has experienced another exciting year. They were awarded the AFJROTC "Silver Star" Community Service with Excellence Award for 2021-2022. This prestigious award recognizes the top 5% of all AFJROTC units based on community service in support of schools and local communities. They have exceeded their award-winning service by more than 400 hours and average nearly 31 hours of community service per cadet.

Our Theatre Program continues to flourish and was recently nominated for over 10 Jester Awards. These awards recognize excellence across a broad array of areas including technical theatre, acting, directing, costuming and program design. Our Band, Orchestra, and Choir are planning a 5-day trip to San Diego and Los Angeles, California next year in March where they will have the opportunity to perform at several events and enjoy some west coast sunshine! Additionally, they received "1" superior ratings at the recent KSHSAA Large Group Music Festival. The parents, staff, students and community which WRHS serves have much to be proud of. Preparing For IB Final Exams

When are IB final exams, and where will they be administered?

Exams begin on May 3rd and end on May 19th. All exams will be administered in the WRHS library or adjacent labs. Please see the schedule below for more details.

Do students sit for final exams in every IB subject?

No. Students enrolled in Group 6: the arts courses do not sit for finals. Instead, they have already completed portfolios, exhibitions, and other projects that are assessed by IB examiners. All other courses conclude with two or three final exams.

When will students receive their scores?

Students will be able to access their scores online on July 6th at 10:30am.

How should students prepare for exams?

- 1. Eat and sleep well. Our bodies and brains perform better when we take care of them.
- 2. Use a space that is conducive to studying. It should be quiet, comfortable, and free of distractions.
- 3. Resist the temptation to procrastinate.
- 4. Make a plan and stick to it.
- 5. Know when you're sitting for certain exams, so you can prioritize subjects. Don't try to prepare for everything everyday.
- 6. Take breaks and reward yourself.
- 7. Form study groups and talk things out.
- 8. Prioritize your toughest subjects.
- 9. Know what to expect in the exam room. While students should be well aware of exam structures and topics at this point, they should not hesitate to reach out to Mr. Bowling or their teachers if they have questions.
- 10. Remember this: nothing that happens during final exams will make or break your life's fortunes. Relax and show off what you can do.

Each year, high schools across the state of Kansas participate in the Jester Awards program, which recognizes excellence in musical theatre. The state is divided into 5 regions, and each participating school is assigned a panel of judges to attend and score their production. Once a list of regional honors is announced, the 2 top scoring honorees from each region are nominated for state-level awards in 24 categories.

For this year's musical, 9 to 5, WRHS received regional honors in 16 categories, with 9 of those going on to be nominated at the state level as the top 10 from around the state, with the exception of Leading Performer with twice as many nominees. As a nominee for Outstanding Production, the cast will be performing a song from the show at the awards ceremony. As a Leading Performer nominee, Mackenzie Smith will also be performing a solo and participating in a group musical number with her fellow nominees.






Washburn Tech's Summer Camp at 5724 SW Huntoon St., is for students entering the ninth and tenth grades. The session is June 12 – 15, and camp runs from 9am until 4pm daily; the cost is \$75 per student. Participants will be able to choose from programs in Auto Service Technician, Culinary Arts, Diesel Technology, Electrical Technology, Graphics Technology, Healthcare, HVAC – Climate and Energy, Information Systems Technology, Machine/Tool, Sterile Processing/Surgical Technology and Welding. <u>Excel in CTE</u> allows students entering their junior or senior year to take college courses. The students do not pay tuition but are responsible for any fees. In-person courses can be taken at Washburn Tech or online courses are available from any Kansas Technical or Community College. It's possible to graduate high school with an industry recognized credential prepared for work or post secondary education.

Why Work-Based Learning?

WBL provides rich educational experiences for students, local business/industry, schools and the community to gain, provide and/or support real-world skills and expand connectivity across all levels with a common goal of supporting the next generation of the American workforce. Part of WBL is Career and Technical Education (CTE) as the strategy for providing the career preparation component of the WBL continuum.

In a state-recognized CTE program, students transition to student learners. Their expanded rigor is identified as an expansion of WBL efforts. Let's explore the benefits of WBL and CTE for each partner.

Students will benefit through:

- Making connections between classroom learning and real-world scenarios.
- Practicing and enhancing personal employability skills.
- Observing exceptional professionals in action.
- Removing the fear of practicing something new.
- Understanding the need for post secondary education, training and/or credentialing to enhance success within a career of choice.
- Networking with future employers and/or community leaders.

In addition, the CTE student learner will benefit through:

- Refining authentic technical skills under the eye of a trained CTE teacher.
- Industry aligned safety training using equipment found on the job.
- Expanded personal growth and leadership development through CTE aligned CTSOs.
- Arranged post secondary articulation agreements which may provide free credit, entrance into juried programs, expansion of scholarships and recognition of CTE program completion while in high school.



Local business and industry will benefit through:

- Expanding a pool of trained workers.
- Sharing education and training needed past high school graduation to enhance success in the field.
- Promoting the importance of employability skills that reflects the specific needs of the identified career field.
- Embracing the desire to give back to the community through school partnerships.

In addition, local business and industry will benefit from partnerships with CTEprograms by:

- Having a voice in workforce training.
- Providing equipment and procedure processes to CTE programs so students can advance skill training before work experiences.
- Ensuring CTE student learners arrive with documented safety training and practices in place.
- Lowering retraining costs by ensuring foundational technical knowledge and skill experiences are aligned to the industry.

Parents and families of student learners will benefit through:

- Expanded career awareness and exploration activities to enhance interest-based career selection before high school graduation.
- Gained confidence the educational experiences are aligned with careers needed today and in the future.
- Stronger engagement to offer student learner support without having to know about the selected career field personally.
- Applied experiences with foundational career training which has little or no cost to them.
- Enhanced skill development through CTSO experiences leading to expanded scholarship
 opportunities, network expansion to include adults already in the field outside of the local community
 and enhanced success skills through leadership and personal growth.

System. Organizations and companies can track the qualifications of their craft professionals or check the qualifications of possible new hires.

This month,teachers Dean Gerlach, Rick Grose, and Melissa Johson attended the NCCER Instructor Certification Training Program, sponsored by AGC of Kansas, to become certified to teach NCCER classes at WRHS. Beginning next school year, they will be able to assess and provide students with industry approved certifications.

NCCER also enhances career development and recruitment efforts for the industry through its Build Your Future initiative. Students will attend Build Your Future Kansas on April 26.

Pittsburg State University's School of Construction hosted its annual Construction Expo on April 12. The Expo allows students, instructors, and contractors to experience tools, equipment, and techniques currently used in the field. Attendees experienced live demonstrations, presentations, and interactive exhibits.




Programming & Software Development







A Magic Stepped in Poison By Judy I. Lin F LIN
