Greetings!

As we wrap up another school year, it's a great time to reflect on the many achievements that have defined this exciting and successful year at WRHS!

From the classroom to the field, stage, and beyond, our students and staff have truly excelled. In athletics, WRHS earned City Championships in Boys' and Girls' Cross Country, Girls' Golf, Boys' Swim, and Boys' Bowling. We claimed Centennial League titles in Boys' Soccer, Volleyball, Girls' Cross Country, Girls' Bowling, and Boys' Basketball, and won Regional or Sub-State Championships in eight sports. Notably, we had three State Champions in Boys' Wrestling: Landen Kocher-Munoz (138 lbs.), Easton Broxterman (144

lbs.), and Kristjan Marshall (157 lbs.). Coaching excellence was also recognized, with multiple coaches earning City or League Coach of the Year honors.

Beyond athletics, our extracurricular and co-curricular programs continue to thrive. AFJROTC returned to pre-COVID enrollment with over 120 students. Highlights included aerial refueling training with the 190th Air Refueling Wing, Distinguished Unit qualification, and a championship win at the Topeka West Drill Competition. Cadets logged over 2,500 service hours and will end the year with a memorable trip to Washington, D.C.

The Music Department also had an outstanding spring. Jazz I earned top honors at multiple festivals, while the Wind Ensemble received unanimous "I" ratings at the KSHSAA Large Ensemble Festival. Orchestra students also shined, with both Chamber and Symphony Orchestras earning Superior ratings at the State Large Group Festival. In all, the department earned 87 Superior ratings at Regional Solo/Ensemble, and will conclude the year with Stringfest and the Awards Concert on May 7. Chorale and This Generation earned top scores at contest, while Ambience, Concert Choir, and the combined choirs received excellent "II" ratings. Chorale also had a special opportunity to perform alongside the Augustana College Choir at Grace Episcopal Cathedral—a highlight of the semester.

Washburn Rural Theatre had an exceptional year. In addition to mainstage productions of The Best Man, Urinetown, and Sense & Sensibility, students shared performances across the district, reaching nearly 1,500 younger students with a touring Theatre for Young Audiences production. At the Kansas Thespian Festival, WRHS earned Gold Honor Troupe status, with 21 students competing—13 receiving Superior and 8 Excellent ratings. Notable honors included a Kansas State Thespian Scholarship for Owen Tremblay, a Thespy Showcase selection for Addie Reach, and Weston Widman being named a Kansas State Thespian Officer for 2025. The WRHS community has every reason to be proud. This truly has been a dynamic and rewarding year! On behalf of the entire team at WRHS, we wish you a relaxing, safe, and joyful summer. It has been our honor to work with you this year.

Tentative schedules for the 2025-26 school year will be available on Infinite Campus in mid-July. Counselors will be available during walk-in registration to assist students with gaps and misplaced courses. Counselors are not available during the summer and therefore, all requests need to be made during walk in registration.

Preparing For IB Final Exams

When are IB final exams, and where will they be administered?

Exams begin May 2 and will conclude on May 21. Most exams will be administered in the WRHS design/think area or other nearby spaces. Please see the schedule below for more details.

Do students sit for final exams in every IB subject?

No. Students enrolled in Group 6: The Arts courses do not sit for finals in those subjects. Instead, they have already completed portfolios, exhibitions, and other projects that are assessed by IB examiners. All other courses conclude with two or three final exams.

When will students receive their scores?

Students will be able to access their scores online on July 6 at 10:30am. The WRHS IB coordinator will share the website and login credentials with students in May.

How should students prepare for exams?

- 1. Eat and sleep well. Our bodies and brains perform better when we take care of them.
- 2. Use a space that is conducive to studying. It should be quiet, comfortable, and free of distractions.
- 3. Resist the temptation to procrastinate.
- 4. Make a plan and stick to it.
- 5. Know when you're sitting for certain exams, so you can prioritize subjects. Don't try to prepare for everything everyday.
- 6. Take breaks and reward yourself.
- 7. Form study groups and talk things out.
- 8. Prioritize your toughest subjects.
- 9. Know what to expect in the exam room. While students should be well aware of exam structures and topics at this point, they should not hesitate to reach out to Mr. Bowling or their teachers if they have questions.
- 10. Remember this: nothing that happens during final exams will make or break your life's fortunes. Relax and show off what you can do.

Impressionism in French: A Creative Finale for WRHS World Language Students

At WRHS, the French students don't just end the year with reading and writing in French—they wrap up their learning with a colorful, immersive experience that brings together language, culture, and creativity.

In their final unit of the year, the French class steps into the world of French Impressionism, using art as a lens to deepen their understanding of the language and the culture that surrounds it. The unit begins with an exciting field trip to the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art in Kansas City. Known for its incredible collection of global art, the museum features a world-class French Impressionist exhibit. Nestled beside the iconic giant shuttlecock on the museum lawn, students explore masterpieces by Monet, Degas, Renoir, and more, all while completing an artist scavenger hunt.

Back in the classroom, the learning continues. Students study the Impressionist movement entirely in French—discussing the artists' techniques, subjects, and styles. They learn how to describe paintings and express opinions, all while building their reading and writing skills.

Each student chooses a French Impressionist painter to research to create a small booklet—in French—about the artist's life and description of their work. Finally, as a culminating project, students select an Impressionist painting and recreate it using acrylic paint. But the goal isn't just artistic accuracy—it's about engaging deeply with the work, learning to describe and interpret it using their growing French skills.

After two weeks of painting, the classroom becomes a mini gallery, filled with vibrant student recreations. To finish, students write a reflection paragraph where they explain why they chose their painting, how they recreated it, and what they learned from the experience. This final unit is a student favorite—a chance to bring language to life through visual art and to use French in meaningful, memorable ways.



Music Department

The WRHS Music Department had another great showing at KSHSAA State Large Group Festival. The WRHS Wind Ensemble, the WRHS Chorale, the WRHS Symphony Orchestra and the WRHS Chamber Orchestra all received straight I ratings! Additionally, the WRHS Freshmen Mixed Choir and the WRHS Concert Choir both received II ratings.



The orchestra has had a productive spring semester thus far! Both Chamber Orchestra and Symphony Orchestra attended the Wichita State University Invitational Orchestra Festival and were able to work with Dr. Mark Laycock (Director of Orchestral Studies) and received feedback from 2 other string judges, giving us invaluable feedback as they prepared for the contest.

Students participated in Regional Solo/Ensemble where we received a total of 5 Superior (I) ratings, and 3 Excellent (II) ratings! Those with superior ratings will be participating in State Solo/Ensemble on April 26th.

On April 10th, both the Chamber Orchestra and Symphony Orchestra attended the KSHSAA State Large Group Festival and were adjudicated by 3 judges. BOTH groups received 3 Superior (I) ratings from the judges and an overall Superior (I) rating overall! The semester will round out with performances at Stringfest and then the Awards Concert on May 7th.

With the number of cakes that she decorates in a day, she has about 4 minutes per cake to decorate! To be a cake decorator at Hyvee, in the interview process, applicants must be able to frost a sheet and layer cake, make borders, flowers, and write on the cake...all skills that students should have after completing our unit on cake. Pay starts at \$17 per hour, and they need to be at least 17 to work as a decorator.

Students learned how to properly apply pressure by hand and how to dress wounds with different injuries. Then we learned how to apply a tourniquet and what locations are the best to reduce blood loss. Students completed training and received certification from Stormont Vail.

On Thursday, April 24th, students from our Manufacturing and Construction & Design pathways attended the 5th Annual Build My Future event at the Stormont Vail Event Center. Students participated in small group seminars, received hands-on training with industry equipment, and gained firsthand insight into the skills and knowledge required for various skilled trade professions. Robotics Students Test The bridge project in Engineering:

Building a popsicle bridge may seem not too stressful, but when you want it to hold at least 200 pounds, it's very stressful. The whole idea is that we design and build a bridge solely out of popsicles that is able to hold many, and I mean many, books. Since it's a competition, we have to decide how exactly we'll judge it. We go off three categories: the weight of a bridge, how much the builders think it will hold, and the actual amount held. We then do a little bit of math and we find out who won, and that happened to be Eyan and Luke, who held 707 pounds. All of that weight on one tiny bridge!

KEVA Tower challenge

While our groups waited for our kayak/canoe projects to be cut on the CNC machine, we decided to attempt the KEVA Tower challenge. About eight people of our class split into 3 different groups that each got a box of the KEVA blocks and got a minute to discuss before the challenge began. The challenge consisted of 15 minutes of stacking blocks in order to have the tallest tower by the end, which sometimes meant using ladders when the tower reached past the builders' heights. The group that had the tallest tower over the two times and six total towers our class attempted was my own group! The members of this group were myself, Ashley Billups, Steven Carr-Metzger, and Kailey Dorzweiler and we were able to build a tower that ended the challenge at 8 feet and 8 inches tall.

This teen teach-in is just one of the ways the district is promoting financial literacy among our youngest learners. The Jump\$tart Teen Teach-In is a nationwide program that has garnered an enthusiastic response from elementary school teachers, high school teachers, and their students. The innovative peer-to-peer educational model, which brings high school students studying personal finance into the elementary school classroom to teach a financial lesson, benefits all involved and is a ton of fun! It also helps cement high school students' knowledge of personal finance by making them "teacher for a day," while elementary school students get early exposure to financial concepts, and the accompanying earned and social media coverage helps start community discussions about the need for youth financial education in the classroom.

International Baccalaureate student, Olivia Ellis, took the lead of coordinating this activity for her CAS project. Creativity, activity, service (CAS) is one of the three essential elements that every student must complete as part of the Diploma Programme (DP). The three strands of CAS, which are often interwoven with particular activities, are characterized as follows:

Creativity – arts, and other experiences that involve creative thinking.

Activity – physical exertion contributing to a healthy lifestyle, complementing academic work elsewhere in the DP.

Service – an unpaid and voluntary exchange that has a learning benefit for the student. The rights, dignity and autonomy of all those involved are respected.

In order to demonstrate these concepts, students are required to undertake a CAS project. The project challenges students to show initiative, demonstrate perseverance, develop skills such as collaboration, problem solving and decision making. Olivia, a student in accounting, the WRHS Bank, and a member of DECA, decided to take on this financial literacy project in order to create an opportunity to promote financial literacy not only to high school students, but also to younger students in our community.

What is the significance of CAS? CAS enables students to enhance their personal and interpersonal development by learning through experience. It provides opportunities for self-determination and collaboration with others, fostering a sense of accomplishment and enjoyment from their work. At the same time, CAS is an important counterbalance to the academic pressures of the Diploma Programme.

While most major photography studios in the area already have these specifications, please have your photographer send a digital file that matches the following:

- No studio imprint (I.D.)/watermark on portrait.
- Photos must be vertical (or they will be cropped to fit a vertical space).





Romance: Shelbi and Andy are both NOT okay. When an accident brings them together, and their connection blooms, it might end up burning too br<u>ight.</u>




Graphic Novel: Ash feels alone in school, with their family, and in this world, so they make a plan to run away into the timber and live off the grid. What could go wrong?
