One main reason that I chose to run for the Board of Education five years ago was because I knew the Auburn-Washburn school community was approaching the need for a bond election. Through feedback received from two years of strategic planning meetings, it became clear that 2022 was the perfect time to pursue Innovation. Opportunity. Excellence. On behalf of the Board of Education, thank

you for supporting this extremely important work, not only for students, but for all in our school community. It was an honor serving as the Board President during the 2021-22 school year. I am proud of the work we accomplished and excited about the bond projects that will be completed over the next four years.

With the bond election passing in April and design and construction partners selected in May, discussions on bond projects have moved from a 30,000-foot view to a very detailed, ground-level view. During a ground-level (literally) discussion on building the second middle

school, the following question surfaced, "Will a new middle school (now) and a new high school (distant future)

fit on the 93-acre plot of land the school district owns located on the northeast corner of Auburn Road and 29th Street?" In 2007 when the school district purchased that land, the original purpose was to

build only a new high school on that property. Our design

partners have confirmed that a new middle school and a new high school, along with the necessary amenities and athletic fields, can fit on this 93-acre piece of land.

As a result of this updated information, we are analyzing the pros and cons of building the second middle school on Auburn Road and 29th Street or on Urish Road just south of 29th Street (51 acres) as we had initially planned. School district leadership will share factual updates as they become available and opportunities for patron input will be offered if indeed both properties are viable options. It is possible that the Board of Education

will confirm a decision on site selection for the second middle school late this summer. \bigstar

Bond Projects Approved and Moving Forward

Because of tremendous support shown by our school community, Auburn-Washburn will engage in \$145 million of capital projects that will be completed over the next four years. Specifically, the school district will pursue the following projects:

- Build a second middle school
- Expand the early childhood program
- Build a Career and Technical Center
- Add and/or repurpose spaces at each school to best meet student needs

Frequent updates will be shared so all in the Auburn-Washburn school community remain informed and engaged on each capital project. In addition to these updates, the district website (<u>www.usd437.net</u>) has a page dedicated to bond projects, and it will serve as a great place to go for current and factual information.

At this time, we are excited to share the following five updates:

- Two architect firms have been approved to partner with Auburn-Washburn on bond projects. HTK Architects, located in Topeka, will be the design team working on all elementary school projects and all WRHS projects. Multistudio Architects, located in Lawrence, will be the design team working on WRMS renovations and upgrades and Middle School 2, which will be built on district-owned property.
- Three construction companies have been approved to partner with Auburn-Washburn on bond projects. MCP, located in Topeka, will be the construction partner working on Middle School 2. Loyd Builders, located in

Ottawa, will be the construction partner working on all elementary school projects, WRMS renovations and upgrades, and the Tallgrass addition. McCown-Gordon, located in Manhattan, will be the construction partner working on all WRHS projects.

- 3. Due to the scope of work, complexity, and length of time to complete, work on the following four bond projects will begin immediately:
 - a. Design work for Middle School 2 and renovations and upgrades to WRMS.
 - b. Design work for WRHS which includes a CTE center, renovations of numerous classrooms and spaces, and additional space for student activities.
 - c. Design work for Pauline Central which includes a six-room early childhood center and significant building upgrades.
 - d. Design work for additional space for student activities that will also serve as a storm shelter at Tallgrass.
- 4. Construction will not begin on any of these projects listed above until late Spring or Summer 2023. It is important to spend the time needed for design teams to engage with staff and other stakeholders to gain a clear understanding of detail for each design.
- 5. It is anticipated that all bond projects will be completed by August 2026.

Each bond project will be approached with the following in mind: **Innovation. Opportunity. Excellence.**

Washburn Rural High School

Washburn Rural High School Theatre's presentation of The Book of Will has been selected to for a mainstage performance at the International Thespian Festival in Indiana University this summer. The festival is described as the national championship of high school theatre. The play was initially performed at WRHS in November. "I think it's been

really affirming for the students involved, because once we were selected, they finally saw in themselves what I've seen in them all along," said WRHS Theatre Director Maeghan Bishop.

The show includes 18 in the cast, and over the course of the year, nine crew members. The faculty

and staff includes Bishop along with Technical Director/ Designer Nick Beasley and Costume Supervisor Linnea Hoyos. In addition to their two performances at the Festival, the group from WRHS will have the opportunity to attend workshops led by industry professionals. "Everything from how to audition for a role with an accent, to theatrical dance, to technical theatre and design," Bishop said "Our technical theatre students will be competing in a 'Tech Olympics'



team event, and we'll also have opportunity to attend the other shows being performed."

Bishop hopes their success this year will inspire those in our district and community to take advantage of the WRHS Theatre productions next year, and even to

get their own children involved in the performing arts in any way they can. \bigstar

2022-2023 Online Registration is Now Open

Online Registration is the first step for returning and new students to sign up to attend an Auburn-Washburn school for the 2022-2023 school year. The registration process will vary slightly, depending on your circumstances. After Online Registration, you will be notified if there are further steps you need to take.

<u>Returning Families</u> - You are a returning family if one or more of your children attended an Auburn-Washburn school during the previous school year. If you are a returning family, you can log into Campus Portal (<u>campus.usd437.</u> <u>net</u>) any time to start or continue your registration.

<u>New Families</u> - You are a new family if none of your children attended grades kindergarten through 11 at an Auburn-Washburn school during the previous school year. Start the process at <u>www.usd437.net</u>. Look for the Registration link.

Washburn Rural High School

All students, including those attending WRHS, will need to register online. There are additional steps that students attending WRHS may need to take prior to the start of school. This includes having their pictures taken, purchasing a parking permit, or ordering a yearbook if desired. High school students may also need to meet with their counselor to make changes to their Fall Semester schedule. (Counselors will be available to make Spring Semester schedule changes and discuss other issues at a later date.)

Washburn Rural High School will communicate directly via email with parents who have registered with details about steps that need to be taken prior to the start of school.

Preschool

Auburn-Washburn offers a limited number of preschool slots for children who meet specific criteria. More information is available at usd437.net. Preschool families, including those who are returning, can complete Online Registration but must call the Early Childhood Center at (785) 408-8378 or email pridemar@usd437.net to finalize registration.

Fees

Once fees are posted, they may be paid online through Campus Portal or at your student's school.
